July 9, 2024 Meeting Minutes

President's Report:



President Warren Na'ai brought the meeting to order at 6:07 p.m. The meeting was recorded and will be available for viewing on YouTube.

Steve from Seattle joined us as a guest.

Warren gave a recap of the club's woodturning demo at the Anthony D. Allen birthday celebration at Washington Middle School on June 15.

Our club has been invited to do a woodturning demo during the Arbor Day celebration at Maili Community Center on November 8. Details to come.

Following reports that the event was a hit, fellow member, Bruce Soll, announced that our club has again been invited to do an exhibit and demo at the Oahu Country Club. It would take place after December. Bruce inquired if members in the audience were interested. There was overwhelming support to move forward.

Warren

Warren gave thanks to Willy Ridep who fulfilled the request of a fellow woodturner from Colorado for monkey pod wood. The turner, Larry Fox, needed the wood to make an urn for someone who recently passed away. Mahalo Willy!

Andy Cole moderated a discussion by members relating their experiences at AAW's Portland Symposium in May. Craig Mason, Kevin Lui, Rob Faris and Bruce Soll gave their thoughts. Comments were overwhelmingly full of enthusiasm and praise.

Treasurer's Report:

Rob Faris reported the account balance on 6/30/24 was \$12290.04.

Evening's Demonstration:

Vice President, Adam Vila, showed us how to incorporate a router jig into our turning projects. As an example of this, he showed a cigar ashtray he made with routed flutes to cradle cigars.



The first step in Adam's discussion was to create a large work surface to attach to your lathe bed. The jig for the router slides over this surface when creating the flutes. Adam used a clamping platform he initially made for his table saw. However, by flipping it over he repurposed it for this routing application.



Adam then proceeded to discuss his experience with various routing options, in particular noting pitfalls he encountered along the way. Photo on the right shows a router jig he made that slides on the wood surface mounted to the lathe bed. By clamping a guide to the horizontal wood surface the direction and depth of the cut can be controlled. Also, by incorporating an indexing wheel, flutes can be made at consistent intervals.



Tech Talk:

Kevin Lui showed a disc sander he made for his lathe. The plywood sanding disc is screwed to a faceplate that screws onto the lathe spindle. The sanding table is mounted to the banjo via a $\frac{1}{2}$ galvanized pipe screwed into a pipe flange. A 1" outside diameter sleeve goes over the $\frac{1}{2}$ " pipe so it fits in the tool rest hole.




Rob Hale showed the Doug Clark Stability Rest he bought at the AAW Symposium. It provides a large flat tool rest surface which helps keep carbide tools on center and stable, especially as you cut deeper into your bowl or hollow form.

From the symposium, Rob also recommended a water-based lacquer finish called Hydrocote Resisthane Plus by Hood Finishing. It can be applied by spraying or wiping on. Rob is impressed with the results.



Rob Faris shared his discoveries from the Gadgets and Gizmos presentation at the symposium. He showed photos of ways to support your work as the finish dries. Photo on the right shows the real value of political yard signs. They can be repurposed to form a tripod to place your wood when you are sealing it.



Your Challenge for the Next Meeting:

In keeping with Adam's router jig demo, Rob Hale laid down a challenge for members to create a bowl, platter or hollow form with some sort of carving detail. The detail can be made by hand and/or by powertool. Be sure your entry fits within a 10" cube. Give it a try gang!
